PROPERTY MINISTRY

The Property Ministry members continue to follow-up. In mid October the Lift to the underground parking was out of operation for servicing purposes. We had a visit from the city inspector who recommended that someone should always operate the Lift and the key should not be left inside the door. Those who uses the Lift should speak with our custodian Alvaro.

Cool-Aid, the maintenance company that services the church, have turned off the radiators in the sanctuary as a result of a leak in the heat exchanger. The inside of the tank itself is corroded and may have to be replaced. A quote was given for the replacement in the amount of \$2,600 plus HST.

We have been faced with another expenditure, the replacement of the handicap device for the door on the Saranac entrance. This has not been working since the late summer and we have been looking at quotes so this can be done. It is a costly replacement, but we will respect the need of our members and others that require the services of accessibility.

We have signed a contract with Richview Contracting for snow cleaning for the winter months. This local company is able to keep an eye on the snow fall in our area and visit several times a day if necessary. This will ensure a safe environment for everyone coming to our church.

In our last report on the erection of a frontal sign for the church we were hopeful for some good news from the city but this did not materialize. Our application was rejected as we cannot put the sign on the property due to the historical designation of the land. Alternate plans are underway and we are applying to another department of the city to seek approval. So don't be dismayed, we will try to get a sign up sometimes next year – keep the faith.

THE CANDY CANE

A candy maker in Indiana wanted to make a candy that would remind people of the true meaning of Christmas; so he made the candy cane to incorporate several symbols for the birth, ministry, and death of Jesus Christ. He began with a stick of pure white, hard candy. White to symbolize the Virgin Birth and the sinless nature of Jesus, and hard to symbolize the Solid Rock, the foundation of the Church, and the firmness of the promises of God.

The candy maker then shaped his cane into the form of a "J" to represent the precious name of Jesus, who came to the earth as Savior. It could also represent the staff of the "Good Shepherd" with which He reaches down to reclaim the fallen lambs who, like sheep, have gone astray.

Thinking that the candy was somewhat plain, the candy maker stained it with red stripes. He used three small stripes to show the stripes of the scourging Jesus received. The large red stripe was for the blood shed by Christ on the cross so that we could have the promise of eternal life.

POINSETTIA **P**OINTERS

You can choose from over 15 different varieties of poinsettias. Since the original plant, first discovered in Mexico, Poinsettias have undergone major cultural advances. Your choice of plant goes far beyond the traditional red varieties. Poinsettias are now also available in associated colours including white, pink, marble and unique varieties such as Jingle Bells (red with white flecks), Pink Peppermint, Lemon Drop and Monet (light dusting of red on ivory and bracts). New colours and varieties are being introduced every year. Coral and salmon colours have been recently introduced and a brilliant orange is also available. Now with genetic engineering sweeping the growing industry, the possibility of even more colours is endless with blue and various hues of purple on the market. Poka dots and speckles and who knows what's next.

Care of Poinsettias

- Place in a room with sufficient natural light to read fine print.
- Check to be sure growing media is moist, many plants become very dry in transit.
- Place plants to avoid drafts or excess heat from appliances, radiators, or ventilating ducts.
- Place plant high enough to be away from traffic and out of reach of small children and animals.
- Put plant in a water-proof container to protect your furnishings.
- Water plant thoroughly when soil surface is dry to touch. Discard excess water.
- ❖ To prolong bright color of bracts, temperatures should not exceed 22°C (72°F) during the day or 15°C (60°F) at night.



Exciting Changes In The United Church

Since 1925, when the United Church of Canada came into being, our church has operated within a four court system. At the top is General Council, then Conference, Presbytery, and the church or charge as it is called.

As of January 2019, we will enter a new phase in our history. Conference and Presbyteries will be eliminated and replaced with Regions. Our new system will continue to have General Council at the top, then Regions, and then the church or charge.

This will give much more autonomy to our pastoral charges. Regions will be much larger than either Presbyteries or Conferences.

We at Asbury and West United Church will be part of Region 10, also known as "Shining Waters Regional Council". In the Anishinaakemowin language Georgian Bay is referred to as 'Shining Waters'. Thank you to everyone who indicated their preference during the service on December 9th.

Peter Hartmanns will be the new Executive Minister of both Regions 6 & 10. His office will be in Guelph.
