

Consequently, the \$1080 (including revenue from the Hospitality team) that was raised will go almost entirely to support Asbury and West programs.

A special thanks to Pauline McKenzie, who once again said an enthusiastic 'yes!' to the idea of a concert and worked diligently towards its success.

If you missed the concert this year, you should definitely make a point of coming next year. Not only did the music and joy light the spark of the Christmas season in all of us; it brought home another important message: vibrant music lives at Asbury and West United Church.

## **Fine Tuning Our Building**

We are almost there!

The past months since we came home have been busy ones. The building systems have been fine tuned and things are almost complete. The heat and air conditioning have been checked and adjusted several times under the supervision of the engineer who designed them. A faulty component in the fire alarm system took a lot of time to track down and replace. The burglar alarm has also needed some adjustments to programming.

At last, we can say that our building is secure. What does this mean? Any one of us who is first in or last out of the building, has the responsibility of **arming** (turning on) or disarming (turning off) the alarm. Please ask a member of the Property Ministry if you need some training.

### The Lift

Congratulations to everyone for learning to operate this machine! You will note that the second stop has been

disabled. This will prevent accidental entry to the daycare level, causing the alarm to sound, which has happened twice when someone new to the building has used the lift.

Property Ministry sees the lift as a potential security problem, since anyone getting through the garage entrance can gain access to the whole building via the lift. To prevent any problems, the outside key will be removed from the lift at the parking level when the building is closed. This means that first person in must fetch the key from the key safe and put it in the lock in the parking level. That person will have to walk up 33 steps, but can ride down!

## Volunteer Opportunity.

The Property Ministry can offer ways for members of the congregation to serve our church that will not require any cash, but will still help our "bottom line." You are invited to join the Property Ministry to help in setting policies for our building. We also invite volunteers to supervise rentals, mostly in the evenings.

We are grateful to our current group of 8 volunteers, but a larger group would reduce the workload for everyone.



## **B**UILDING **R**ENOVATION **C**OMMITTEE

During the last several months we have welcomed numerous visitors into our new church home. All of them are impressed with the design, functionality and versatility of the building. Please take the time to become familiar with the new features of our church home. Here are a few things to remember.

- 1. <u>Underground Parking:</u> The ample underground parking is warm, safe and well lit. You need a code to enter the underground parking, the same code to enter the church from P1 and the same code to leave the church when going back to your vehicle. You must remember the way that you entered and leave. Several people have found themselves on P2 because they chose the wrong garage exit. (The green exit signs are for pedestrians; not vehicles.)
- 2. <u>Heating:</u> We have economical heating for the winter and air conditioning for the summer. Remember the rattle-trap old system in the old building that frequently broke down as we enjoy our new environment.
- 3. Security: Our building has sophisticated safety systems to protect us and our \$6 ½ million investment. If you are the first person entering the building or the last to leave you need to know the proper alarm codes to disarm or re-arm the security system. Property Ministry members can show you the simple steps needed to arm and disarm the alarm system.
- 4. Sharing our building with others: We have two new tenants, Forest Hill Montessori and Toronto Emmanuel Korean Methodist congregation. We also have groups that rent parts of our building for meetings, parties and special events. This rental income is a crucial source of revenue for us. After your church meetings, please make sure that your group puts away your belongings and leave the area the way you found it.



5. The Lift: The wheel chair lift requires some training and understanding but can save us climbing the stairs. Instructions are posted inside the lift. Please take the time to read and follow the instructions. REMEMBER TO TURN THE INSIDE KEY TO THE "OFF" POSITION when you reach your destination. Failure to turn the inside key to "OFF" means the next user must walk up 33 steps. Then they will be asking who it was that last used the lift so please be considerate.

We have been back in our own building since June but it is taking time, money and patience to complete the final stages of the project. Thanks to Pauline McKenzie for all the time and effort that she is exerting to make sure that every last detail is completed according to instructions.

The Building Renovation Committee will continue until June 2015 when the building warranty period expires. I sincerely thank everyone who helped make this major project successful. I hope that we can enjoy the building for many years to come and welcome many new people into our church home.





A candy maker in Indiana wanted to make a candy that would remind people of the true meaning of Christmas; so he made the candy cane to incorporate several symbols for the birth, ministry, and death of Jesus Christ. He began with a stick of pure white, hard candy. White to symbolize the Virgin Birth and the sinless nature of Jesus, and hard to symbolize the Solid Rock, the foundation of the Church, and the firmness of the promises of God.

The candy maker then shaped his cane into the form of a "J" to represent the precious name of Jesus, who came to the earth as Savior. It could also represent the staff of the "Good Shepherd" with which He reaches down to reclaim the fallen lambs who, like sheep, have gone astray.

# FINANCE $\mathcal{M}$ INISTRY

Money and finances are a critical part of the life of any family, including the Asbury and West United Church family. Here is a brief summary of our debts that need to be repaid:

Mission through Finance \$157,500 Interim Minister Sabbatical \$9,000 (estimate)

Repay manse Fund \$233,000 **TOTAL** \$422,100

We anticipate receiving some money in the future related to the building renovations but it will not be enough to cover all our debts.

Fund raising events such as our walk-a-thons, sales concerts and dinners help our financial situation. Our modern and versatile church building provides us with new opportunities to serve our community and improve our finances.

Our building is sought after by people wishing to have family parties and hold special events.

You can help by assisting Property Ministry "baby sit" these parties and events. We need to

develop new events that our new neighbours and old friends will enjoy attending. We can have a lot of fun while we are serving the community and improving our finances. What can you do to help?

The 2015 pledge campaign was a disappointment. I had hoped that there would be a significant increase in pledges. That was not the case. Instead of pledges increasing, the total monthly amount pledged DECREASED by \$271.68 per month for 2015. It will be far more difficult for AWUC to pay our bills and reduce our debt unless this changes. It is not too late to make a pledge and increase your donations for 2015.

We are about to start our first full year back in our renovated building. You all have time, talents and treasures. Please be generous with them and do your part to make 2015 a successful and rewarding year.
